Marti's life became unbearable, and she felt she couldn't go on living. All she could think of was how to end the terrible suffering for herself and the children. Then one day she came up with a plan. She decided to throw her children and herself

under the train that ran nightly on the tracks near her home.

Finally, she couldn't take it any longer and summoned the

out her plan. She prepared herself and her children and got ready to meet the coming train. Then she turned on her radio to disguise what she was doing.

By the grace of God, the 10 p.m. Women of Hope program had just started, and the words of hope Marti heard caught her attention. God touched her heart, and he changed her mind about destroying their lives.


Instead of committing suicide that evening, she continued to listen to the program. Sometime later, Marti received Christ as her Savior,

and a new hope was born in her. She raised her children, who married and had their own children. God enabled her to watch the three of them grow up.

A few months ago, Marti contacted the TWR Women of Hope office and said, "If it weren't for Women of Hope, I wouldn't have met my grandchildren."

Marti is now a woman of faith in God who loves her precious family – and she continues to listen to and enjoy the *Women of Hope* program.

Education is a fundamental tool for the personal and professional development of women. Although there has been significant progress in female school enrollment, school dropout rates are a challenge, especially in rural and indigenous communities. We pray that God would give vision, strength and perseverance to equip and train each woman with the purpose of putting her talents into practice to serve and reach more women in their communities.

We have seen the power of God in women's health. Through TWR Women of Hope, we desire to speak hope to women and remind them that God is interested in every aspect of their lives - physical, mental, emotional and spiritual - regardless of their geographic location or socioeconomic status. Because the Lord cares for and values every part of us, he desires that we partner with him in being good stewards of our bodies.

Gender violence remains a serious problem in Mexico.

According to government statistical data, a large proportion of women will have experienced some type of violence during their lifetime. We praise God that he is the one who dignifies, protects and brings freedom to women. And through the Holy Spirit, God's Word and the body of Christ, women's broken lives damaged by trauma and sinful behaviors can find healing and restoration.

The work that women do as homemakers, providing family care and taking care of the many necessary domestic tasks each day, is critically important to the well-being of society. Sadly, these activities are rarely recognized as legitimate work. Moreover, in the workplace, women face additional challenges regarding pay and advancement opportunities. We pray for cultural and mindset changes in all of these areas.

With the launching of TWR Women of Hope in Mexico, we seek to help women establish a growing and vibrant relationship with God as we bring prayer and the teaching of God's Word to them. May these bring freedom in women's lives and help enact cultural change so they can live up to the full potential that God originally planned for them.

### Offering God's love

**Upholding** women who face frightening change

Have you ever considered how drastically a life can change in mere seconds? In the blink of an eye, the unexpected can completely redirect our lives. A marriage proposal, made and accepted in under a minute, irrevocably alters a couple's future. The confirmation of pregnancy triggers a whirlwind of thoughts and emotions, a lifetime of possibilities flashing before a woman. In an instant, a mother-to-be understands she is embarking on a new path filled with emotion, adventure and hopeful anticipation.

While such changes bring immense joy, not all life alterations are welcome. Some are frightening and destabilizing. A friend once said, "It seems God sometimes shakes our boat to shift us from one course to another." This perfectly captures the feeling of facing the unexpected. These "shakes" can range from a simple scare to being thrown overboard. In moments, skies darken, and a storm reroutes our lives. We know the unexpected is inevitable, yet we are often unprepared when it occurs.

As we pray for women enduring the aftermath of war, natural disaster, poverty, economic crisis and other external forces, we are reminded of Naomi, a woman in the Old Testament who faced unimaginable

misfortunes. Her life was marked by unexpected and unavoidable changes, demanding constant adaptation.

It is heartbreaking to consider the tragic memories that haunted her. Widowed while her children were young, she faced the daunting task of raising them alone. Later, when life seemed stable, another tragedy struck: the deaths of her sons. Alone with two widowed daughters-inlaw, Naomi was forced to choose a new path, returning to her homeland. Ruth, one of her daughters-in-law, chose to accompany her. Naomi and Ruth returned to Bethlehem of Judah.

Their fresh start was difficult, requiring hard work and resilience, but their story has a hopeful ending. Ruth married and had a son, filling Naomi's heart with the joy of grandmotherhood. Naomi endured loss, sorrow and change, yet she remained steadfast in her faith. The Lord provided her with wisdom, guidance and grace to navigate each challenge.

Thousands of women today share similar stories. We hear daily of wars erupting, natural disasters devastating landscapes, and living conditions drastically changing, causing the crushing pain of loss of both earthly possessions and loved ones. Forced to flee their countries, they face the challenge of learning a new

language and adjusting to a new culture. Overnight, their comfort and security vanish. Fear, pain, confusion and insecurity become their constant companions. But there is hope. We can raise our voices to the Lord – who is a very present help in times of trouble - and ask for his assistance in every aspect of their lives, from learning a new language to building a supportive community. He offers physical, mental and spiritual healing.

The Lord used people in Naomi's restoration process. To this day, people still play a crucial role in the lives of those suffering. I am extremely thankful for your hearts of compassion. I appreciate that you take time to present these women before the Father so they may have hope. This month, I also encourage you to seek ways to offer practical help to people around you. You may assist women in their languagelearning process, lend your ears to listen to their traumas, use your voices to pray with them, or maybe simply offer the warmth of a hug. Your presence and concern will be a beautiful expression of God's love.

Thank you for walking with us. May you find comfort in knowing you are never alone: "For I am the Lord your God, who upholds your right hand, who says to you, 'Do not fear, I will help you" (Isaiah 41:13).

#### A reflective heart

ow do you handle strained relationships with those you love? What do you do when you sense tension or separation in your friendships? If we want to find that place of healing and reconciliation with them, it may need to begin by taking the time to check our own hearts and attitudes.

If we are willing to put in the necessary work to restore our friendships, how much more important is it to make sure that our relationship with God is healthy? One solution I've found is to regularly take the time to reflect on my life and examine my relationships with God and with others. I ask God to search me, and I invite the Holy Spirit to

reveal to me where my heart has strayed. How easy it is for each of us to be blinded by the sin in our own lives if it is deeply buried. That is why I love to pray Psalm 19:12-14 to God:

> "But who can discern their own errors? Forgive my hidden faults. Keep your servant also from willful sins; may they not rule over me. Then I will be blameless, innocent of great transgression. May these words of my mouth and this meditation of my **heart** be pleasing in your sight, Lord, my Rock and my Redeemer."

If we realize that our relationship with God is the most valuable thing in our lives, we see the importance of reflection. Whenever we sin, a wall is put up, blocking our fellowship with God. Many of us have experienced this wall after having an argument with a spouse or friend. We can feel the separation between us.

But God has given us a beautiful gift – forgiveness of our sin through confession and repentance. Wanting to once again be in that place of intimacy with our Father, we can welcome the opportunity not only to identify what is separating us but also to gladly confess and repent of our sin so that our fellowship is restored.

If we come openly to God with a sincere heart wanting him to find anything in our lives that is hindering our fellowship with him, he will honor that prayer and gracefully show us. This happened recently to me as I was having an extended time of silence and solitude with the Father.

I had begun my time asking God why I was not having victory over pride and judgmentalism in my life. Frankly, I was tired of confessing these sins to him. As I entered my time of silence, I was surprised that my thoughts were going back to my childhood. Scenes of my family during some painful situations played through my mind.

I questioned God about why he was bringing these things up right now. And he revealed to me that this was the place where the deeply buried root of my pride and judgmentalism had been formed. Because I had perceived the painful

events as happening only to my family members but not to me, I did not realize the impact it had on my life.

And God showed me that I needed to forgive them. Equally important, I didn't understand the ramifications of my pridefully judging my family members for their behavior. God graciously showed me that my reaction to them had been sinful and that it was the source of my stronghold.

The Father gently walked me through a time of forgiving my family members and then led me in confession and repentance of my own sin toward them. It was a significant moment for me. And with a heart of gratitude for this precious gift of forgiveness. I celebrated and took communion with a clean heart. God broke the power of that stronghold in my life that day. He severed the deeply buried root that I had not even known existed.

Taking the time to reflect on our lives is essential if we are going to allow God to do the deep work within us that he desires to do. Will you join me in making reflection a regular habit as we humbly bring our hearts before God?
